













2000s		January 13, 2000: Steve Ballmer becomes Microsoft's second CEO, succeeding Bill Gates, who hired him in 1980 as the company's first business manager.
		October 25, 2001: Windows XP goes on sale. This ad was photographed in New York City ahead of the launch.
		November 15, 2001: The original Xbox goes on sale. Bill Gates stands in New York's Times Square days ahead of its release.
		October 27, 2008: Former Chief Software Architect Ray Ozzie announces Windows Azure, Microsoft's first foray into cloud computing, onstage at the company's Professional Developers Conference.
